

A DAY ON THE SKEENA RIVER

On a clear, hot day we boarded the Zymoetz riverboat at Kitsumkalum. Fred McKenzie, Ken McDames Jr and myself in one boat and Wilfred McKenzie and Terry Collins in another. Being my first time on the mighty Skeena River, I was excited and enthusiastic to start the day.

The start of the morning began with a scenic drive-by of all of the tourists along the banks of the Skeena, fishing for the world renowned Steelhead and Spring Salmon. It was amazing, the amount of people in boats, camping and fishing along the banks of the river, all the way towards Prince Rupert. I was informed that this year was slower than previous years in terms of tourists coming to fish, I couldn't imagine what a "busy" year would look like.



All up the way up to the Kitselas Canyon, the guys checked every net to inspect that they were legal and had the correct information attached. We were stopping along the way to chat to Kitselas members who were onsite to gather information on the fish numbers and also if



there were any illegal nets being set along Kitselas sites.

Out of 202 Kitselas members, there are 5 main shoreline spots which have to be shared. The Kitselas Resource Department enforces the 48 hour per week limit per member, to give equal opportunity for all members to fish. This is difficult, considering there is only 5 spots from shore, but if you have access to a boat, basically fishing spots are endless along the Skeena and tributaries of the Skeena (Copper River, Kleanza Creek etc).

Once we made our way to the Kitselas Canyon, the guys set a net to catch fish for Elders within the community who do not have the means to catching their own fish.



They then began to get everything ready to set the fish-wheel in place. This process is a tough feat, considering the limited amount of space to work and the heat, but they were successful and I was thoroughly amazed at the level of teamwork. Consequently, I was told that the fishwheel is going to need to be repaired due to the fact that within the day of it being set up, as a young dead black bear was swept up in the apparatus, damaging it.

Next we went to Ringbolt Island to scour the rocks for the petroglyphs, which were very hard to find. So hard to find in fact, that we didn't find them. Regardless, being in the middle of the Skeena River on Ringbolt Island was exciting and left me with a feeling of pride, knowing that our community is striving to keep its cultural identity and succeeding everyday with new initiatives and ideas.

We returned to the place in which the net was set, gathering approximately 25 fish. Again, I was amazed at the level of hard work and effort they showed while



pulling in the net together as a team.

The ride back down river was leisurely and calm, the sun was blazing down and although I was merely an extra passenger, having the opportunity to see the Kitselas Resource Department in their daily work routine was both exciting and rewarding. I wouldn't have normally thought that so much hard work was necessary and they did it with an enormous amount of ease and humor. Overall the whole day was wonderful and productive, and I got my first sunburn in my entire life to remember the day by.

Kitselas Members Fishing Designation

All Kitselas Members are eligible to obtain a Fishing Designation License provided they:

- Have proof of status / membership
- Have a thorough understanding of the Kitselas Fishing Regulations

Regulations:

- Gill nets (set net) must be marked with designation # and name of Kitselas Member on BOTH ends of the net. This is to ensure that Kitselas Membership guardians can patrol and check legitimacy of the net.
- Fishing designation cards are NON-TRANSFERABLE. They cannot be lent, borrowed or passed down to any other person at any other time.
- The registered Kitselas Member must be at the net site during net-check, if they have a medical condition/disability, another person can be added to their designation card upon approval from the Kitselas Resource Department and the Kitselas Band Council.
- Fishing periods are 48 hours per week, per designation card.
- A designation card does not permit the sale of salmon.
- All catch figures must be accurately be reported to the Kitselas Resource Department.
- All fish that is caught out of a gill net, must be retained.
- For Transportation of Food Social Ceremonial fish, out of the Terrace area, a transportation permit is
- required. It may be obtained at the Kitselas Resource Office located at: 4562 Queensway Drive

Information needed for a Transportation permit:

- Information on where the fish will be transported to: from where to where
- Transporting vehicle information
- Address of both Departure and Arrival locations

KITSELAS HOUSING UPDATE

Kitselas has been growing as a community very quickly. With another 18 homes to be built on the Gitaus Reserve, our community will be expanding yet again. A project of this scope will cost approximately 2.8 million dollars, averaging over 200 thousand dollars per unit / home.

At this time, Kitselas Band Council and the Housing Coordinator are developing the construction costs affiliated with building these homes. As it is a lengthy process which involves INAC and CMHC and All Nations Trust / Insurance, there is a certain degree of waiting which should be expected. The process itself is very detailed and requires hard work to get all of the paperwork, documents, figures in order prior to the actual building stage.

There is a 6 stage process that needs to be followed, Kitselas now being in Stage 4. For each stage, a Kitselas Band Council Resolution is needed to ensure quality control and proper follow through. Kitselas is currently in good standing with CMHC eventhough there are issues outstanding, mainly regarding arrears from previous additions to the community.

It is extremely important that all members pay rent on time and if there are any arrears, they should be addressed accordingly. When paying rent, it does not to be given directly to Winnie, it can be left a the front desk or given to Frances or Jan in the Finance Department. Please keep this in mind when coming into the office to pay, as an appointment is not necessary.

Housing applications are available for members to fill out if they are interested in applying for a home on reserve. All applicants are required to go through a routine background check and have all documents filled completely to ensure a quick process.
